Help Stop the Largest Proposed Cut to Conservation & Recreation in PA History!

Governor Corbett's proposed 2012-13 budget eliminates all conservation, park and recreation funding from the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund of which the Susquehanna Greenway is a recipient. The budget goes on to propose that the termination of funding be made permanent. This means a loss of \$30 million for conservation in 2012-13 and far more in the long-run. It would be the biggest cut to conservation funding ever proposed in Pennsylvania. The Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund is Pennsylvania's only funding source that directs money specifically to community park and

- Tell them that Keystone has supported important projects in their district and is vital to making new projects happen.
- Tell them you oppose the Governor's budget proposal to divert community park and land trust grant money from the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund to general state operations.
- Tell them to tell their legislative leaders and colleagues that the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund must be protected in the budget negotiations.

PA American Water's Environmental Grant Program grants up to \$10,000 for environmental activities like watershed cleanups, restoration, buffer, or hazardous waste collection efforts. Projects must be located within a PA American Water service area. Applications are due **March 24**. Learn more here. The 2011 list highlights 10 endangered resources, including the two covered bridges of Sullivan County and the Noxen LVRR Depot in Wyoming County. The issue features several flood-damaged resources, as well as other properties that are threatened by demolition, significant deterioration, vandalism, alteration, and/or loss of their historic setting. Researchers on the River

Prof. Cynthia Venn

Students who work with Cynthia Venn, Professor of Geography and Geosciences at Bloomsburg University understand that getting wet is just part of the job. Together with Christopher Hallen, Professor of Chemistry, the researchers analyze the chemical content of the



Susquehanna River. "Using canoes, or a small motorboat, students take water samples from multiple sites on the river including Danville, Shady Nook, Watsontown, and Milton," says Venn. "They do really great work, and we haven't lost a team over the dam at Sunbury yet!" In the field students consider the turbidity (how cloudy the sample appears) and filter the water to test for alkalinity and acidity. Once the life preservers come off

and the lab coats are thrown on, Venn and her students continue their work on campus with specialized equipment. Read more about this research <u>here</u>.
