Gages Critical To River Management State of the Susquehanna Report Released



The Susquehanna River Basin Commission (SRBC) recently issued a State of the Susquehanna report showing trends in key water resource indicators. SRBC cites the lack of reliable funding for stream gages to be the greatest threat to the future of water resources management in the Susquehanna watershed. Read more here.

The good news: Nutrient and sediment monitoring data indicate the overall health of the Susquehanna River Basin is continuing to

improve. Also, of the more than 49,000 miles of rivers and streams in the basin, less than 14 percent are impaired for aquatic life uses. Read the full report here.

\$1 Million for Trails, Paths, and More

Over a million dollars is available for alternative transportation projects in eight Central Pennsylvania counties – Clinton, Columbia, Juniata, Mifflin, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, and Union.

Through the federal <u>Transportation</u> <u>Alternatives Program (TAP)</u>, \$1,031,608 is available locally for projects such as trails, sidewalks, bike lanes, crosswalks, overlooks,



lighting, and rehabilitating historic transportation facilities. Funds may not be used for routine maintenance. Applications must be submitted by **Friday**, **April 12.** Click here to read more.

Lancaster County Access Improvements

Requires Partial Closure of Pequea Boat Launch

PPL Holtwood has begun work to build two new boat ramps, docks, and parking at the Pequea Boat Launch on the Susquehanna River in Lancaster County. "PPL is committed, as part of its operating license for the Holtwood hydroelectric plant, to expanding recreational



opportunities for the public along the Susquehanna River," said John M. Levitski, PPL's regional community relations director for the Lancaster area. The project is expected to be finished by mid May. For safety, the boat ramp area and parking lot will be closed during construction. Work will be conducted weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. For more info, click here.

It has helped conserve more than 154,000 acres of green space, supported over 1,900 park projects, and funded 570 historic preservation projects!

Mild winters can mean ticks are on the move earlier than expected. To spread the word on Lyme disease prevention among trail users, the Endless Mountains Heritage Region recently obtained informational signs to be posted along local trails. "We got the signs from our local Department of Health office in Towanda. They received them from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) with some fliers on Lyme disease which we have as well. We gave out eight signs last year to different

trail groups," said Executive Director, Phil Swank.

I've been reporting – and enjoying – the progress of the craft beer revolution in Pennsylvania for almost 20 years, and I've never seen anything like what's going on

along the Susquehanna River right now. From Harrisburg up to Wilkes-Barre, new breweries are popping up all along the river; it is the hottest spot for beer in the state.

You can check out four of them in an easy 24-mile drive, starting in the thriving rivertown of Berwick at <u>Berwick Brewing</u>, running downhill along the river to the <u>Inn at Turkey Hill</u> and <u>Marley's</u> in Bloomsburg, and finishing up at <u>Old Forge Brewing</u> in the middle of the shops and stores of Danville's Mill Street.Of course, you'll have to have a designated driver, because while the food at all four stops is great, the beers shouldn't be missed!
