

## Picnic in the park

EWISBURG — Late afternoon sunshine fell on the brilliant green grass of an unexpected urban oasis on the last Thursday in August, as people filtered in to find a seat among the towering trees of Soldiers Memorial Park.

Located on Front Street, between Market and St. John streets, the 2-acre park features benches and picnic tables, which fulfilled their purpose during the second "Picnic in the Park" sponsored by the Lewisburg Neighborhoods Corp., working with the Lewisburg Downtown Partnership.

The event is the second in a number of events planned by the group to help people reconnect with the Susquehanna River.

Food vendors stood ready to supply the needs of those who didn't bring their own meals, while children played tag and climbed on the rocks at the end of the park. Once the bases for the former water towers of the Lewisburg Waterworks Co., in operation in the 1880s, the huge stones mark the antiquity of the park, which has been in existence for over a century. Adults sat and watched, enjoying the scene and the chance to relax and chat.


Like many towns in the early 1800s, life in Lewisburg at one time centered on the river. It was a source of commerce and a means of travel.

A system of canals connected communities along the West Branch of the Susquehanna. With the advent of modern transportation, in the form of railways, the river took a backseat to the much quicker means of moving goods and people from one area to another.

The canals are mostly gone now, and people are beginning to discover a new relationship with the
